Amy could feel that a cold was **coming on**. Let me know when grandma **comes round**. Look – Jenny's conked out. She must've been exhausted. My father has been **coughing up** blood for a while now. You need to **cut out** sugar as far as you possibly can. Oliver is in bed **dosed up** on painkillers. Your daughter **dropped off** at about eight o'clock. Yes, the cancer has been **eating away at** your bones. His life is slowly **ebbing away** before our very eyes. Since dad died my life has **fallen apart**. Uncle Jim **fell down** and broke his back. I was jogging, then I **fell over** and landed on my hand. We need to **fatten you up** before you leave hospital. Theresa is currently **fighting off** leukaemia. We'll have to **fill up** two test tubes with your blood. It appears that her eczema has **flared up** badly again. Call back next week so we can **follow up on** your results. Grandpa is finding it hard to **get around** at the moment. Fantastic that you have managed to **get over** your illness! Can you **get up** and walk to the wall and back, please. Don't **give up**! You've nearly finished your treatment. I was really hoping it would **go away** without medication. It's a shame she had to **go through** such pain, isn't it? When I **grow up** I want to be a surgeon, like you! If you **gulp down** the medicine quickly, you won't taste it. **Hold out** your hand and try to grab the rail. They **hooked** dad **up** to the life support machine. All of a sudden Alison **keeled over** and hit the floor. Auntie was **kneeling down** but couldn't get up again. The combination of pills **knocked him out** completely.
